

POINTS OF INTEREST

BRIGHTON HERO of HMS HOOD

Mrs Jeffs has recently bequeathed a large sum of money to Association funds. Mrs Jeffs was the brother of CPO Archibald Henry Surrey of Brighton, Sussex who was lost in Hood on that tragic day in May 1941. CPO Surrey spent most of his wartime period in Hood but did serve for a time in Renown and indeed was on board Renown when she encountered the German battlecruiser Scharnhorst near Narvik in 1940. 'Archie' as he was known joined the Navy in the summer of 1928 on the advice of his father who had served in the RN for 37 years. Archie was generally regarded as one of the best qualified shorthand writers in the Royal Navy and was detailed for special duties on at least two occasions. These were at the Inquiry into an incident involving the battleship HMS Royal Oak when he was specially sent out from England to the Mediterranean to take the official shorthand notes at the Court Martial proceedings and he was also given similar duties at the Inquiry into the loss of the submarine HMS Thetis. In the New Years Honours List for 1941 'Archie' was Mentioned in Despatches for

'Outstanding zeal, patience and cheerfulness, and for never failing to set an example of wholehearted devotion to duty without which the high traditions of the Royal Navy could not have been upheld'

Archie had served in the cruiser HMS London in the Mediterranean for three years before the war and was engaged in duties at the Admiralty in London when war broke out in 1939. At the time of his death CPO Archie Surrey was 33 years old and left a wife, Dorothy, and twin boys.
