Trafalgar 200 Celebrations

To mark the bi-centenary of the Battle of Trafalgar, the Royal Navy held a programme of events in Portsmouth and the Solent commencing with the International Fleet Review and Son et Lumiere on 28th June, followed by the International Drumhead Ceremony on 29th June and the International Festival of the Sea from 30th June to 3rd July. Ted Briggs accompanied by Peter Heys was invited as guests of the Royal Navy at these events.

The International Fleet Review was the centrepiece of the programme at which Her Majesty The Queen reviewed a fleet of some 150 ships, representing about 40 countries, from her platform onboard *HMS Endeavour*. Ted and Peter were hosted for this event onboard the RFA ship SirBedevere sailing in convoy with *HMS Endeavour*. Ahead of the steam past, HRH The Princess Royal joined Sir Bedevre to witness the Review. During the evening a 'Son et Lumiere' was held off Southsea Common, staging a Napoleonic era sea battle using Tall Shops and state of the art pyrotechnics, followed by a rather spectacular firework display and concluding with the 'lighting up' of the Fleet in the Solent.

The International Drumhead Ceremony held the following day adjacent to the Naval War Memorial consisted of a solemn religious ceremony, led by the Bishop of Portsmouth, to remember the thousands of maritime men and women who laid down their lives in conflict and peacetime. The Ceremony then looked to the future and the passing on of memories to the youth. During this part of the Ceremony, our own Bill Stone was publicly interviewed by Kate Adey about his naval experiences. The event was attended by HRH The Duke of York and HRH Prince Michael of Kent, VIP guests and some five thousand maritime veterans and their partners from the UK and around the world, and was followed by a reception providing an opportunity to seek out comrades

The International Festival Of the Sea held in the Portsmouth Naval Dockyard offered an opportunity to climb onboard vessels from around the world including historic tall ships, the latest warships, elegant yatchs and work torn boats. The event featured combat displays by our Armed Forces, the sights, sounds and smells of life in Nelson's day, interactive exhibitions, a theatre and an opportunity to look around the Museum, HMS Victory, HMS Mary Rose and other exhibits and exhibitions on site.

From the Vice Chairman Keith Evans who also attended the International Drumhead Ceremony and World War 2 60th Anniversary Festival of Commemoration on Horseguards Parade on 10th July, both events being blessed with glorious sunshine. The latter event was covered in the regional press, an extract from Keith's published letter read, The event on Sunday was graced by the presences of the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh with whom, the then Lieutenant Philip Mountbatten Royal Arthur at Corsham in Wiltshoire prior to to his wedding to the then Princess Elizabeth. I feel sure that the entire nationwill echo the words of Sir Tasker Walkins VC (1944) in his speech of thanks to the Queen at Buckingham Palace Luncheon when he said 'M'am keep well – stay with us much longer – you have our eternal and abiding Love. God Bless You.

I sent a birthday card to Vice –Admiral Sir Louis LeBailey KBE CB on the occasion of his 90th birthday on the 18th July on behalf of the association. Sir Louis served in Hood 1932 and 1937-40. He responded with 'Best Wishes to Briggs and Co. He wrote that Sir Harold Walker, Captain of HMS Hood in 1938 and later Admiral Harold Walker, had invited himself to tea at Sir Louis home in North Cornwall at the end of August.

In mid July I accepted an invitation to give a talk about my 35 years in the Royal Navy to some 30 members of the Surrey Military Collection Society at their hall in Reigate. The audience comprised of veterans and others of the Royal Navy, the Army, Royal Air Force and Merchant Navy.

During discussions much interest was expressed about the life of HMS Hood. One member Chief MEM Brian Mitchell has forwarded a copy of an interesting publication 'HMS Hood' by Lieutenant S Geary RNVR with a forward by Vice- Admiral W Whitworth and includes stories by two members of her ships company namely Chief Petty Officer Bill Lowe 1930 – 33 and Able SeamanBob Tilburn one of 3 survivors on 24 May 1941 and by Leading Sick Berth Attendant Sam Wood in HMS Prince of Wales in action with Bismarck.

In my letter of thanks for the £30 I received in recognition of my talk which I sent to King George's Fund for Sailors. Commodore Barry Bryant the Director of Seafarers UK wrote 'My own grandfather served in HMS Hood several years before the war albeit as a lowly Leading Torpedoman, so I always had a personal interest in her history.


Reunions


